




















One of the high points of the junior year is ordering the class ring. That is the time when juniors call in all their debts and beg their parents for money.

"This is an emergency! Evacuate the building!" These are the words that rang through the halls of the school buildings January 28, 1982. A break in a gas line caused a tremendous amount of pressure to flush through the low lines in the town, causing furnaces to blow up and fires to spread all over town which were not located in any particular section of town. Immediately, surrounding towns sent their fire departments to aid the Centralia station. Many people were affected. Everyone from friends in school to the elderly. The most important and blessful part of this tragedy was that no one was hurt. Everybody stayed reasonably calm, followed instructions, and cooperated with town officials. Many people offered their help in shutting off gas and going through the area looking to give help to the needy.

As the day grew on, the feeling of

uncertainty subsided, and the firemen began to get the fires under control. The job of taking care of the people left without homes now lied ahead. Red Cross came in and set up aid stations in the local churches providing food, clothing, and shelter. As the day turned into night, speculation of turning the gas back on was being broadcast over radio stations. Others were sitting around watching the national attention on TV from helicopters, planes, mobile units who came in to cover the fire. This helped because people noticed and began to send donations in immediately. The aid stations stayed opened throughout the night as men turned the gas back on and heat was in the community. The work went well into the morning as well as people beginning to regroup their lives. We attended school the next day, and next few days were ones that

showed people really, still care. Clothes, food, and furniture along with money were provided for the people devastated by the fires.

Centralians' pride showed as everybody chipped in and the people picked up and got going again. The fire pulled everybody together, but it's a shame that such a tragedy was what did it.



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
