The day before Thanksgiving break, high school students and staff surprised Evanoski with an unexpected sendoff. Even channel 8 showed up to broadcast the event.

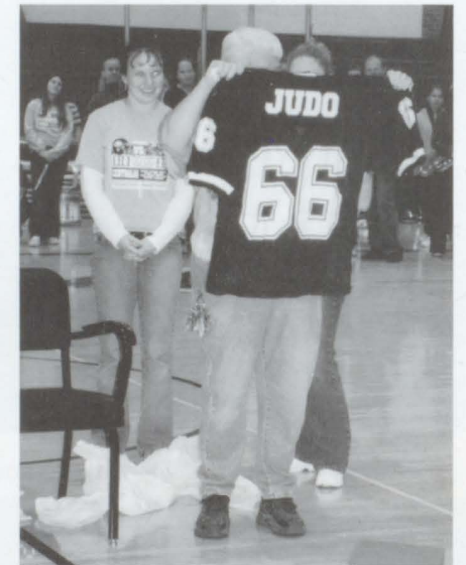

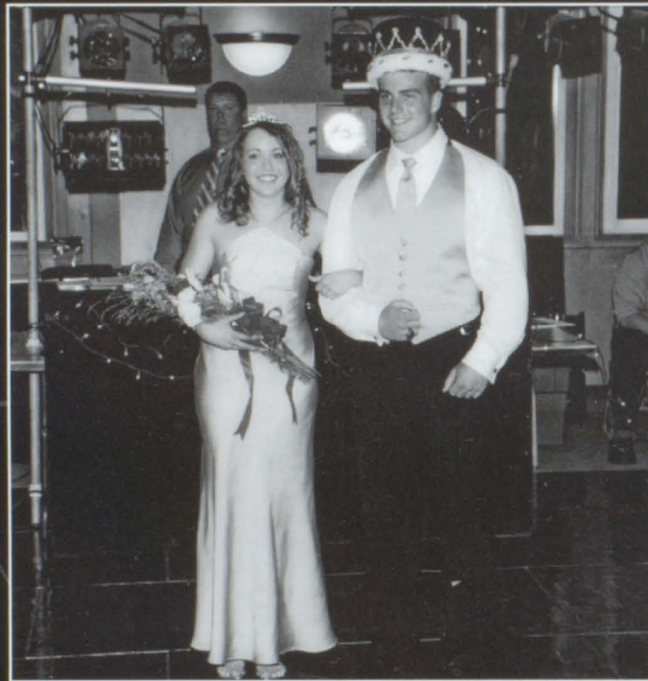


# PROM 2004

# 91 Seniors Graduate; over \$150,000 first-time scholarships

Sponsored by the Centralia Ministerial Alliance and the Class of 2004, baccalaureate took place at 7 p.m., May 9, in the high school gymnasium.

Commencement was at 3 p.m., May 16. Juniors Adrienne Schneller and Travis Cummins escorted the 91 seniors to their places in the high school gymnasium. Valedictorian Joni Bowne and Maggie Brunner spoke to their class after trying out for the coveted honors.

Superintendent Dr. Glenn Brown reported to family and friends that 47 percent of the class plan to attend a four-year college or university, 26 percent plan to attend community colleges, 7 percent will attend vocational/technical schools, and 3 percent plan to enter the military.

Brown also reported the seniors earned over \$150,000 in first-time scholarships, with a renewable value over \$500,000.

Music was provided by the concert band, chamber choir, and the seniors sang the Alma Mater as the ceremony concluded.

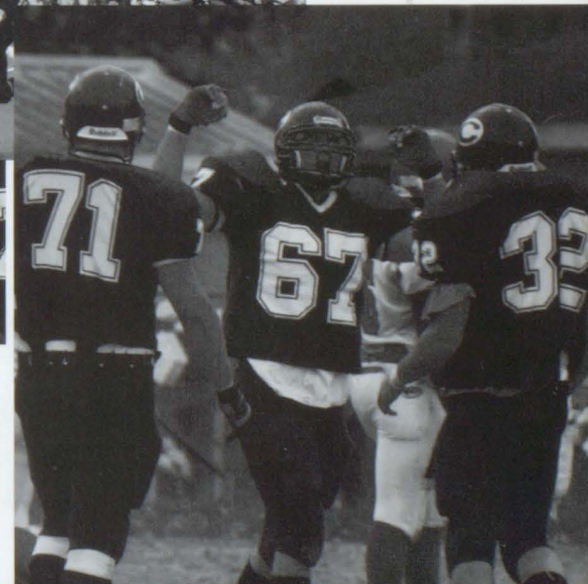


# Class 2A State Champions!

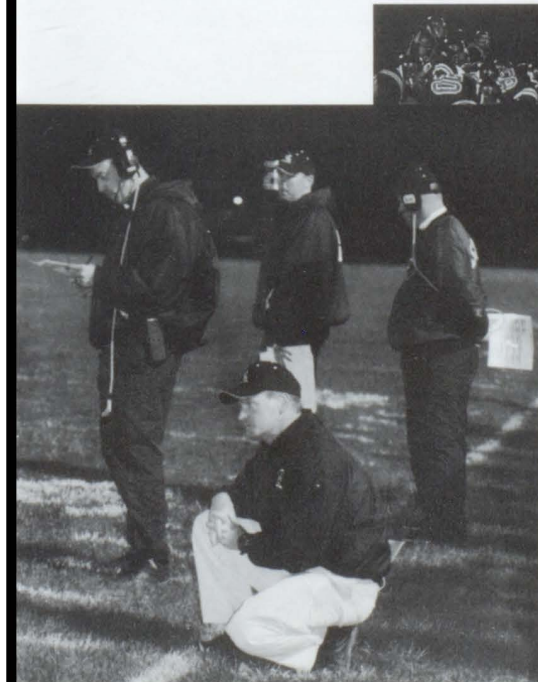


teams never even scored on Centralia in the regular season including: Highland, Blair Oaks, Monroe City, Bowling Green, Macon, North Callaway and South Shelby.

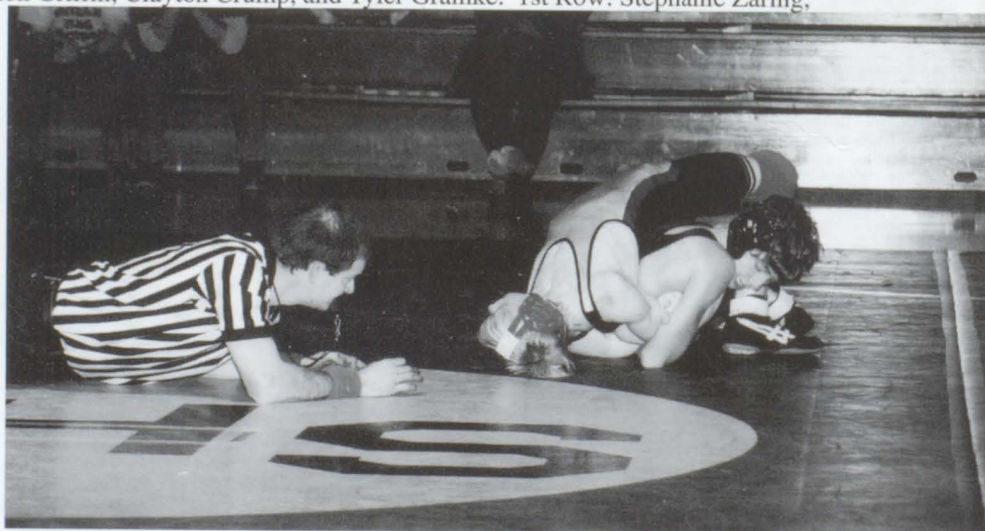

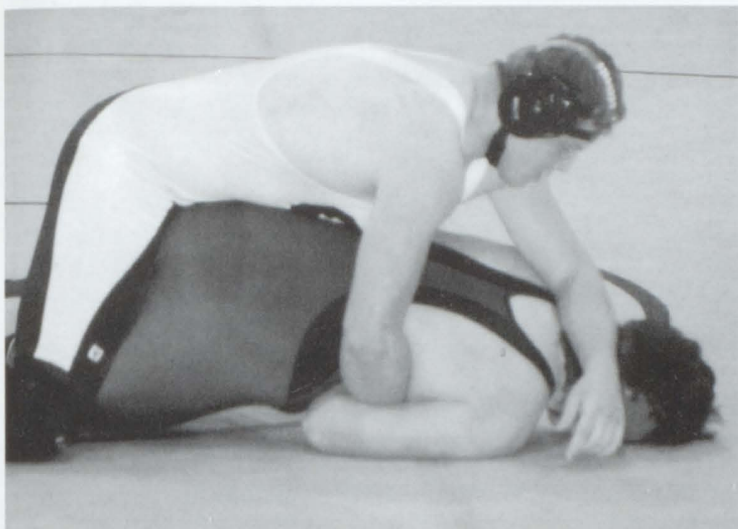

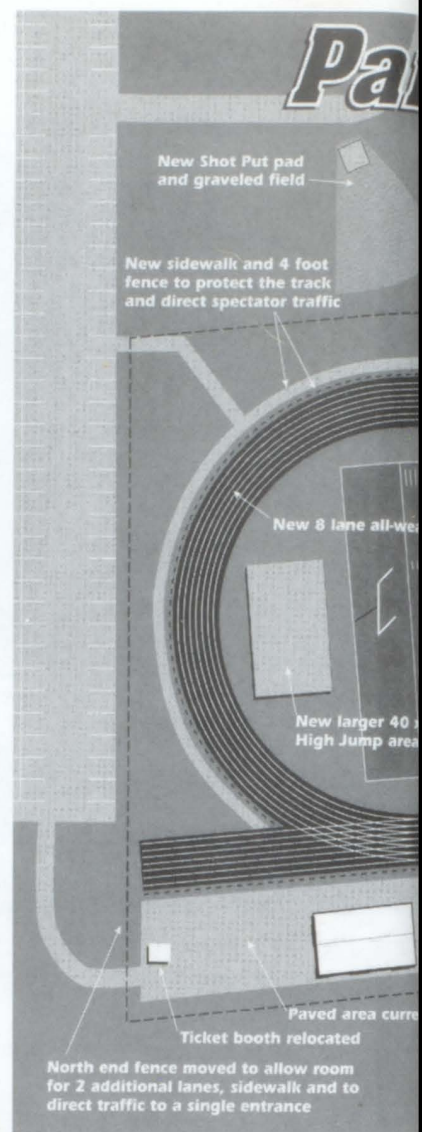

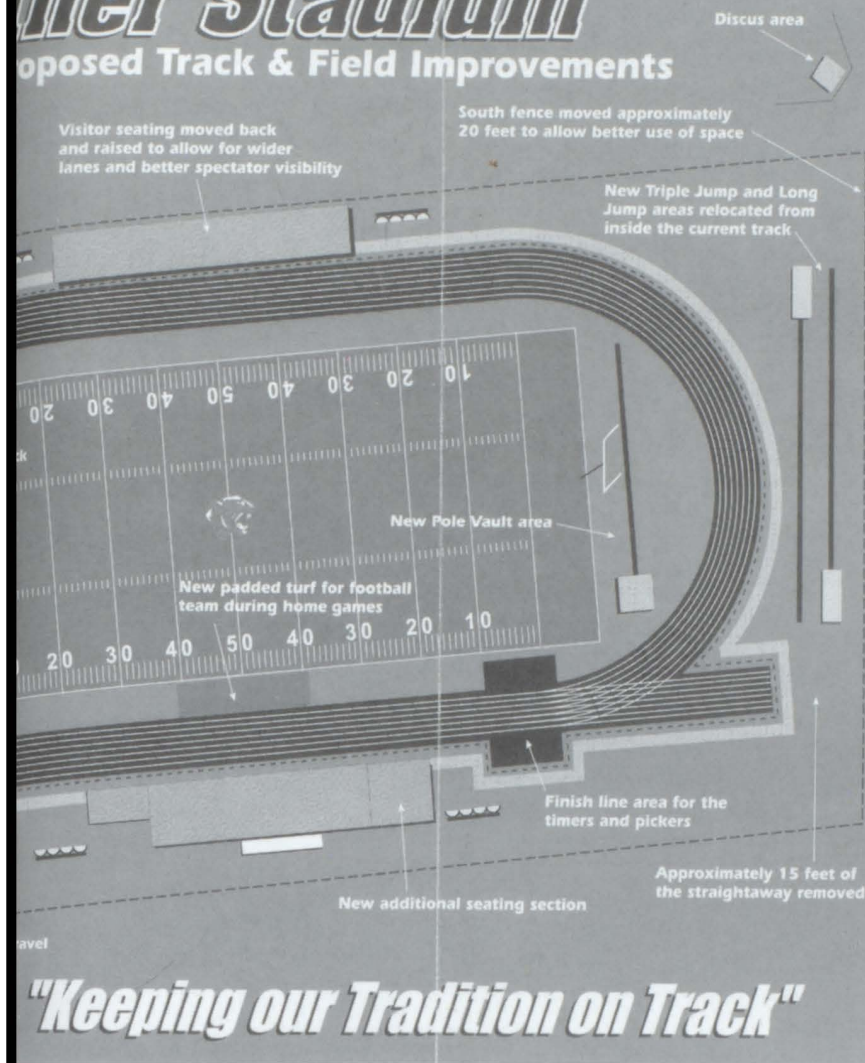

# Art Club

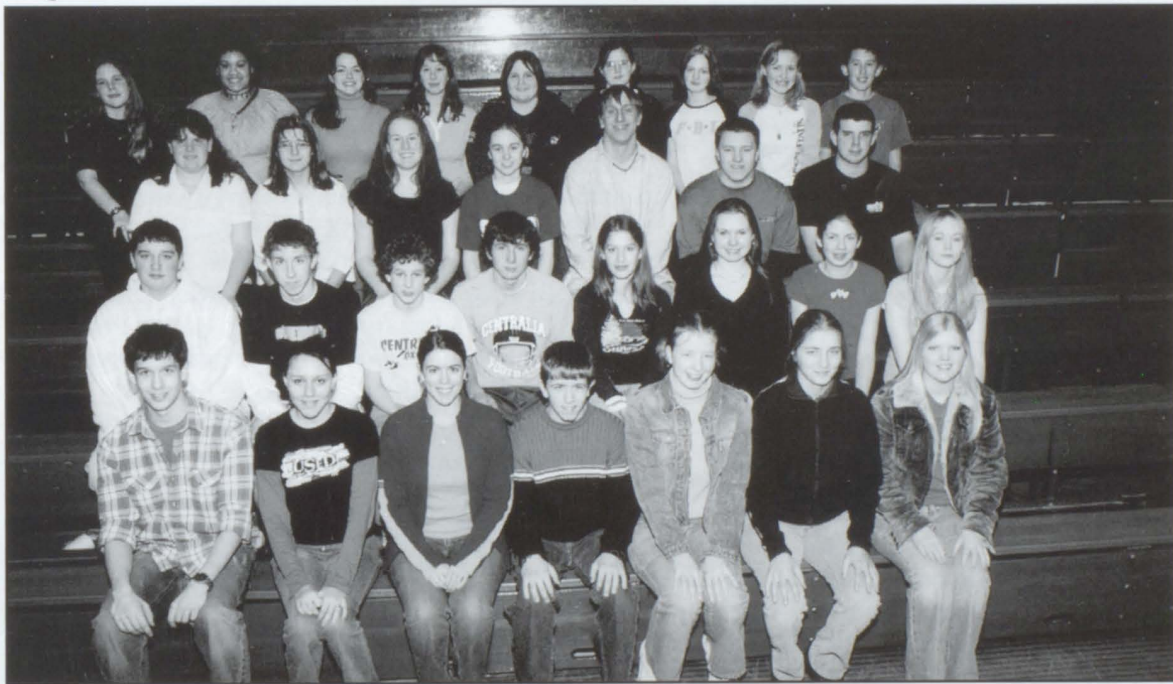

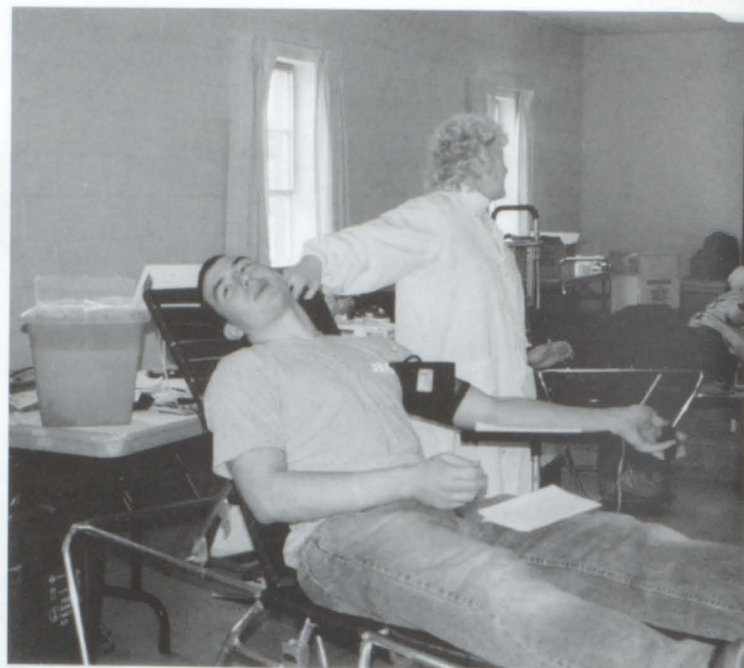

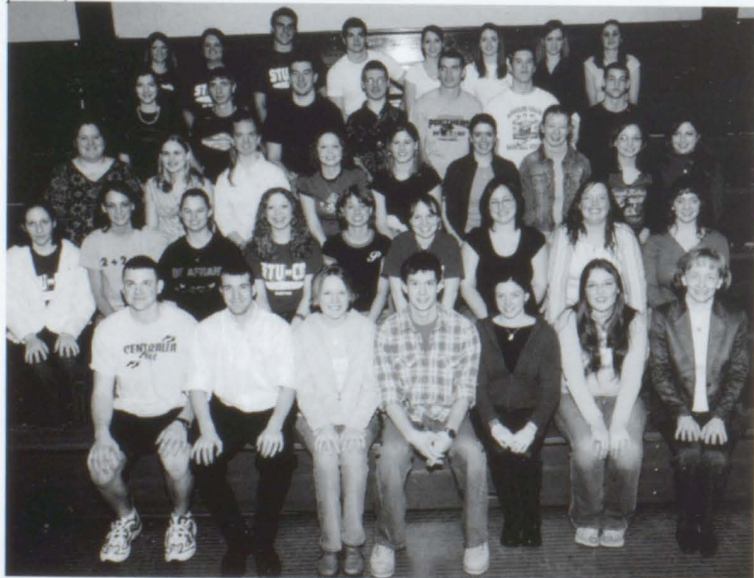

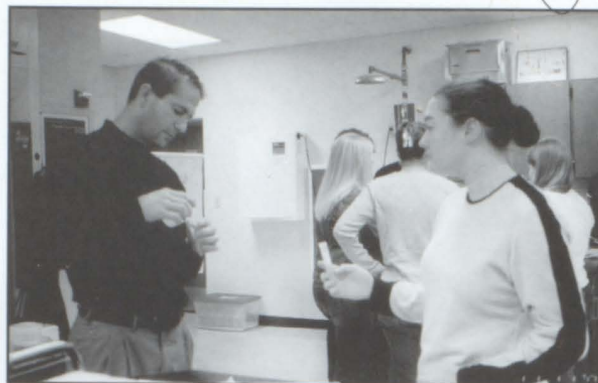

Mike Hight taught the follow-

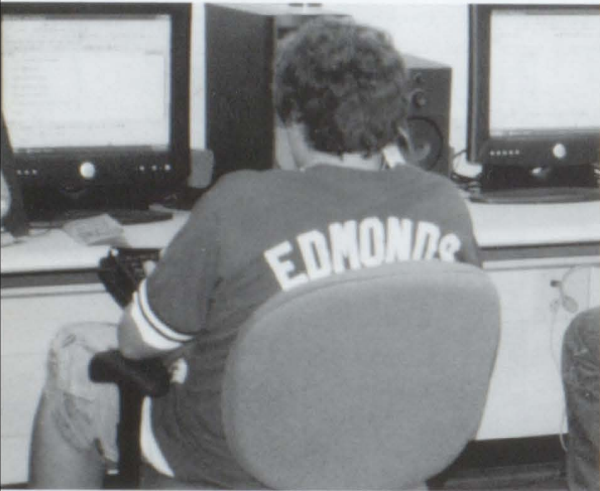
ing industrial technology courses: principles of technology, Woodworking I and advanced woodworking, and Drafting I.

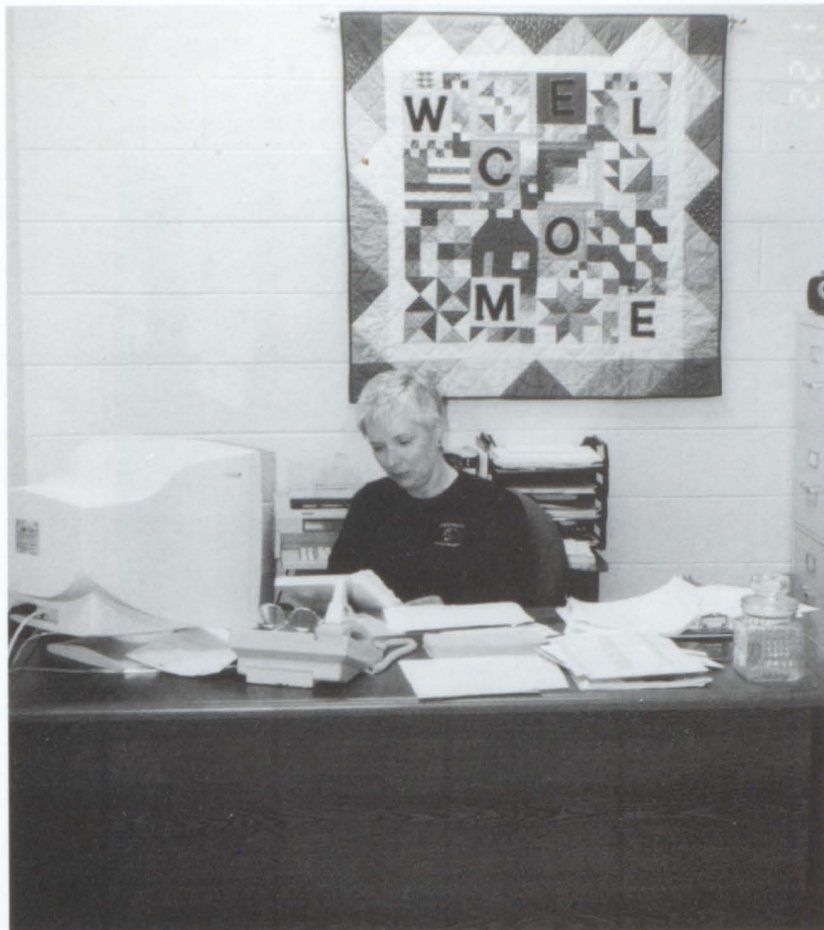

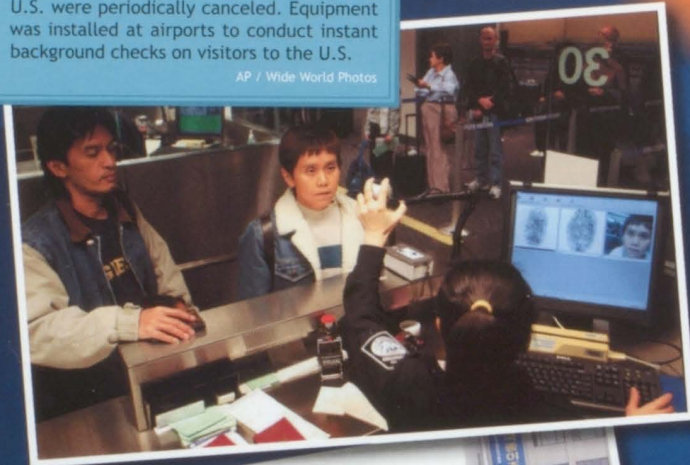

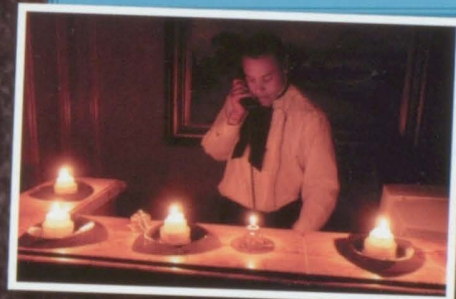

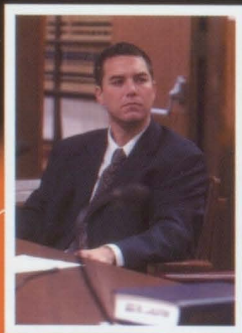

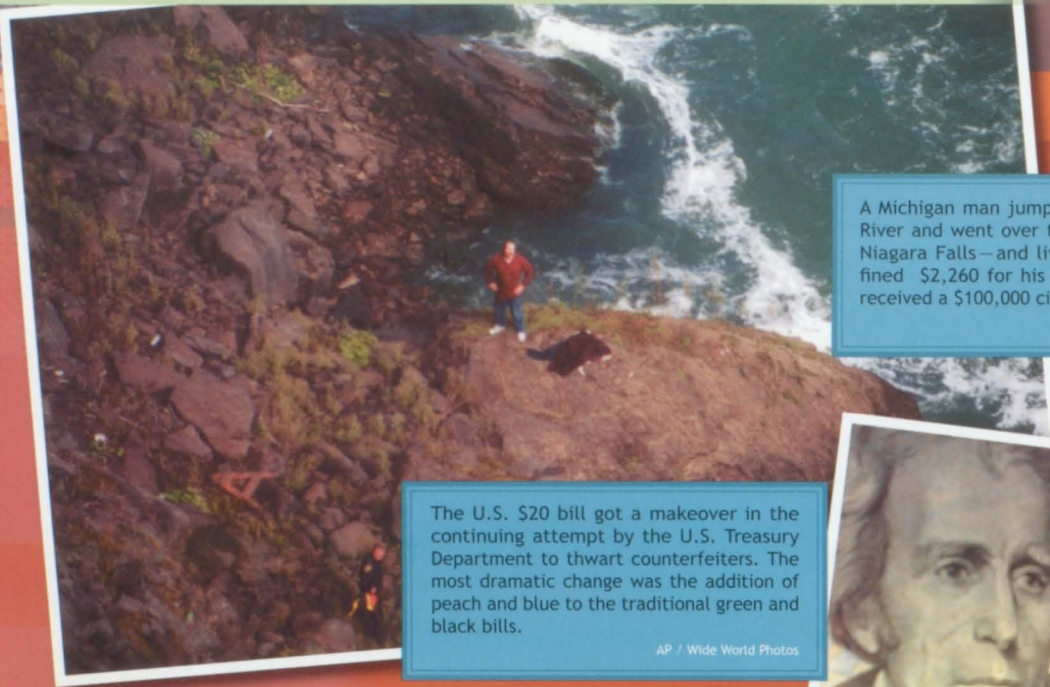
Taking a cue from many states, President George W. Bush signed into law a federal "do not call" list. People can request to be on the list and avoid calls from many telemarketers.

Get your rest before you get behind the wheel in New Jersey. The state has become the first to have a law against drowsy driving. Under the law, a driver who causes a fatal crash can be charged with vehicular homicide if there is evidence the driver was sleepy.

A homesick man thought it would be cheaper to fly himself home as cargo, but officials said he paid about the same as a first-class ticket. Charles McKinley shipped himself in a crate from New York to his parents' home in Dallas in a 15-hour journey that had officials concerned about the lack of security.

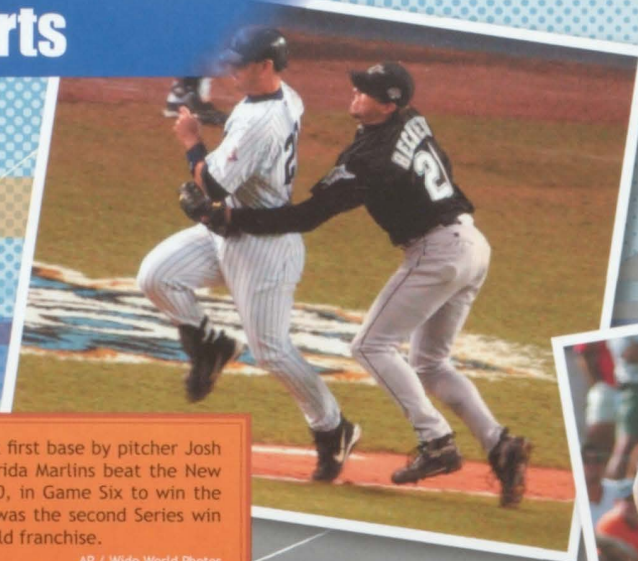

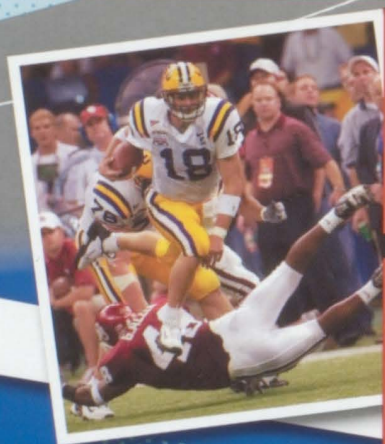

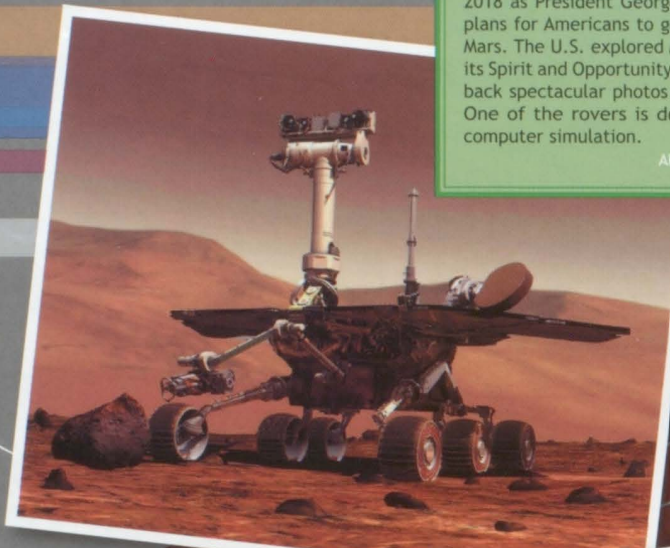

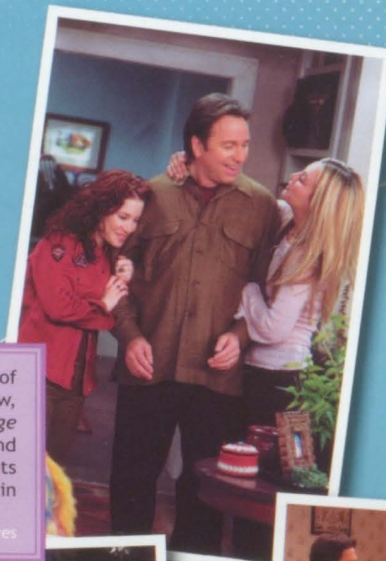

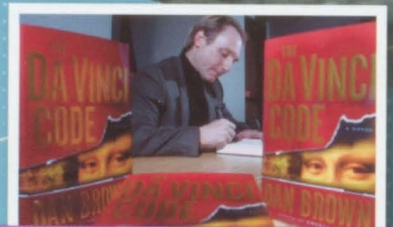

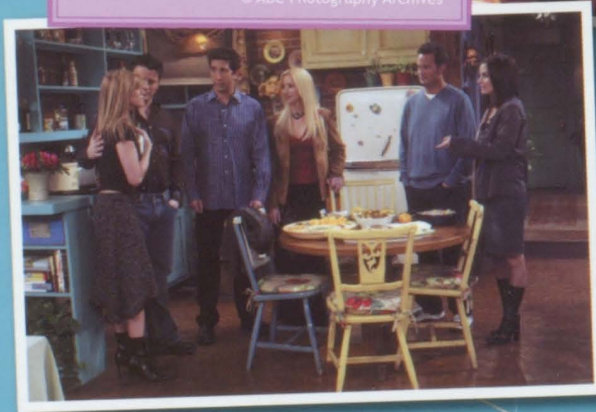

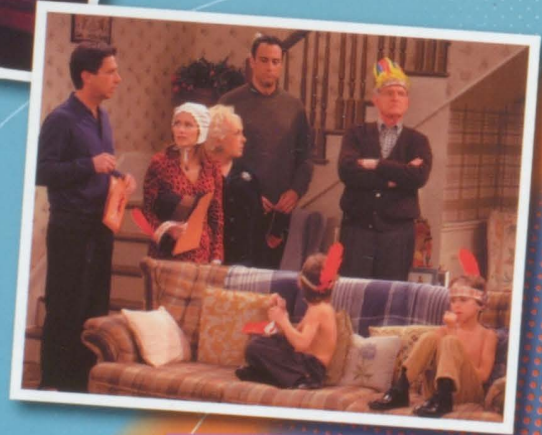

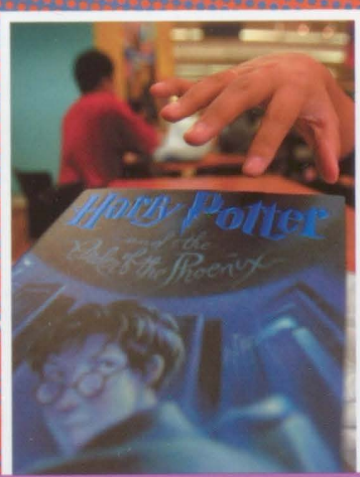

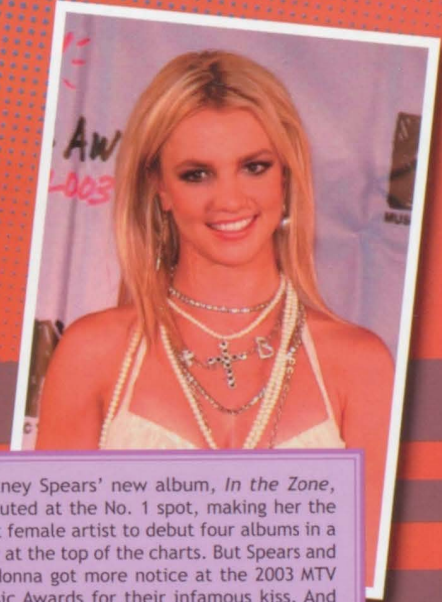

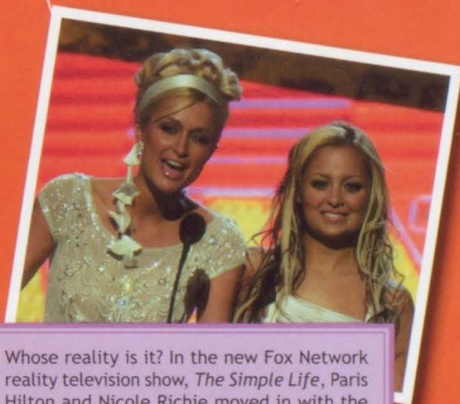

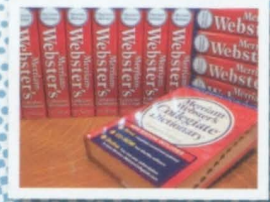
