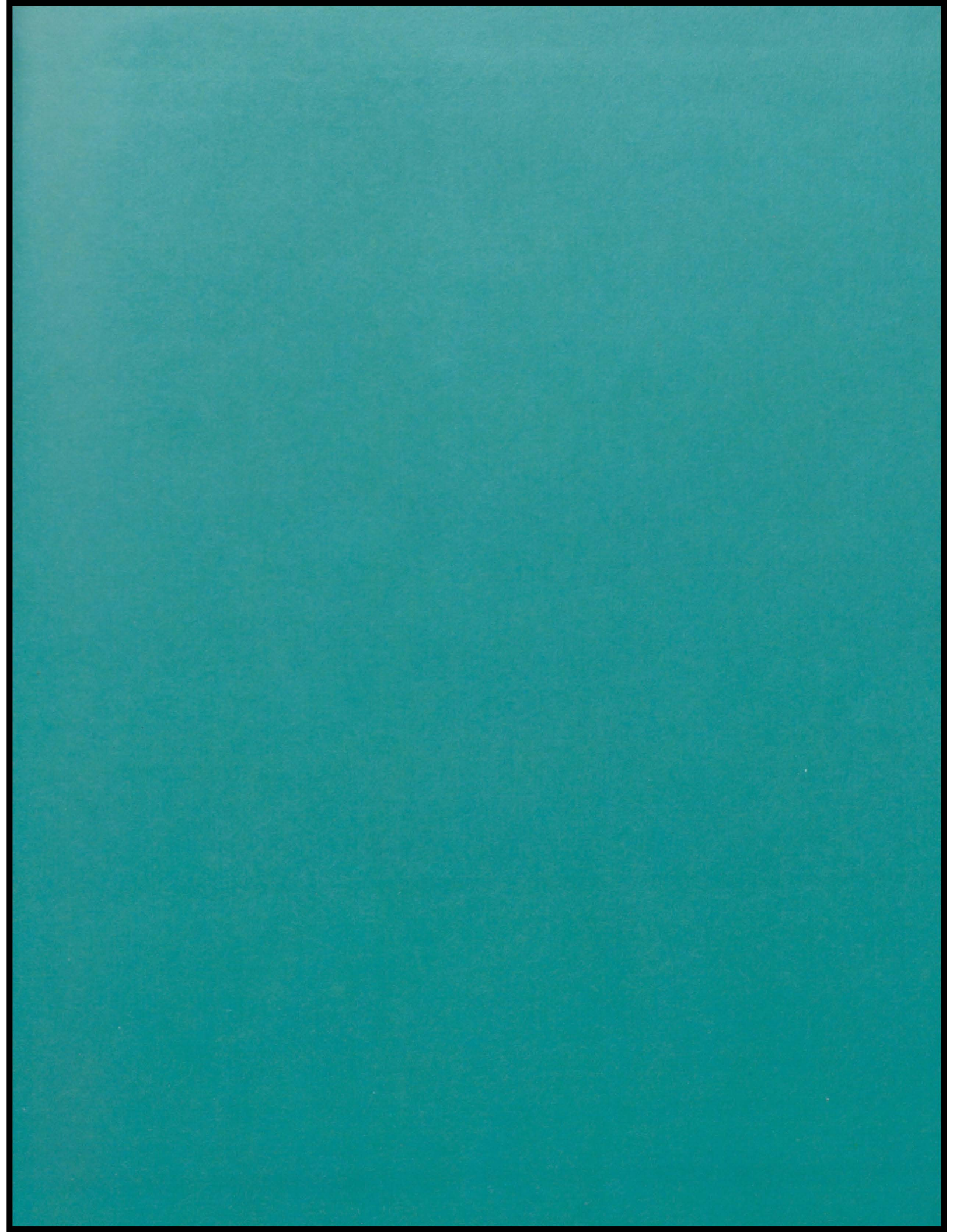

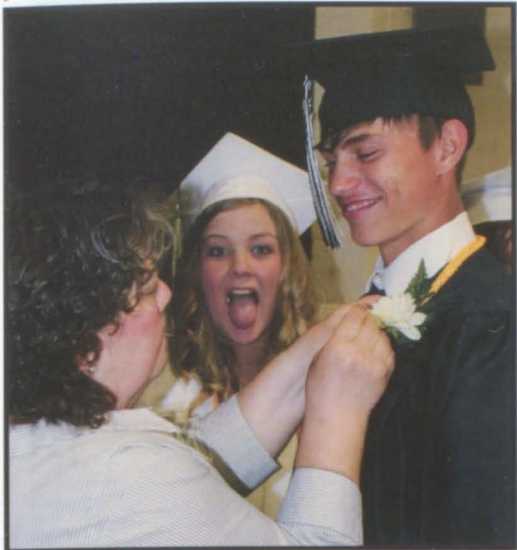

Taylor Jacobson (Sr) put it best when she said, "I will miss all of the team spirit at the games and all the friends that you gain in high school."

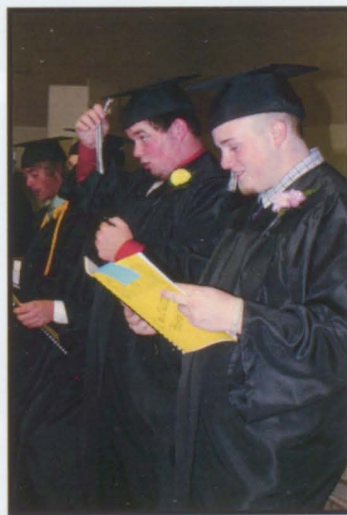

Taylor Burton (So) was a representative from India and had this to say about the project. "I thought the Mock U.N. was a great time and a great opportunity for us to have fun and learn."

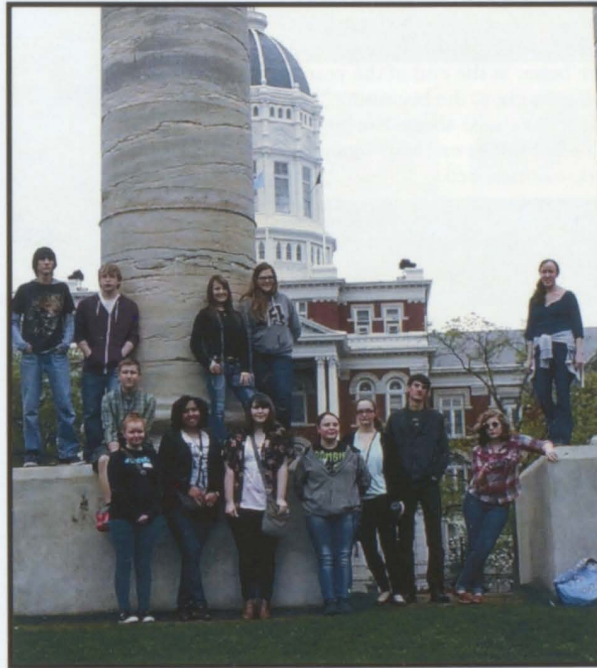
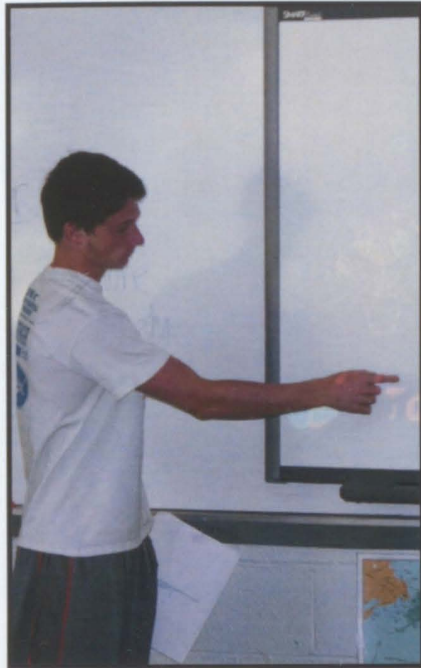
The Language Arts

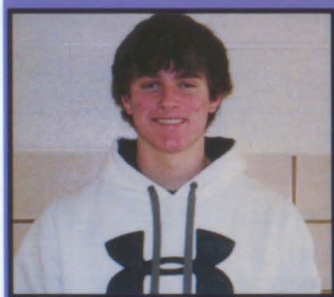

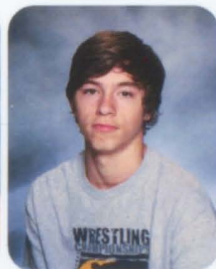

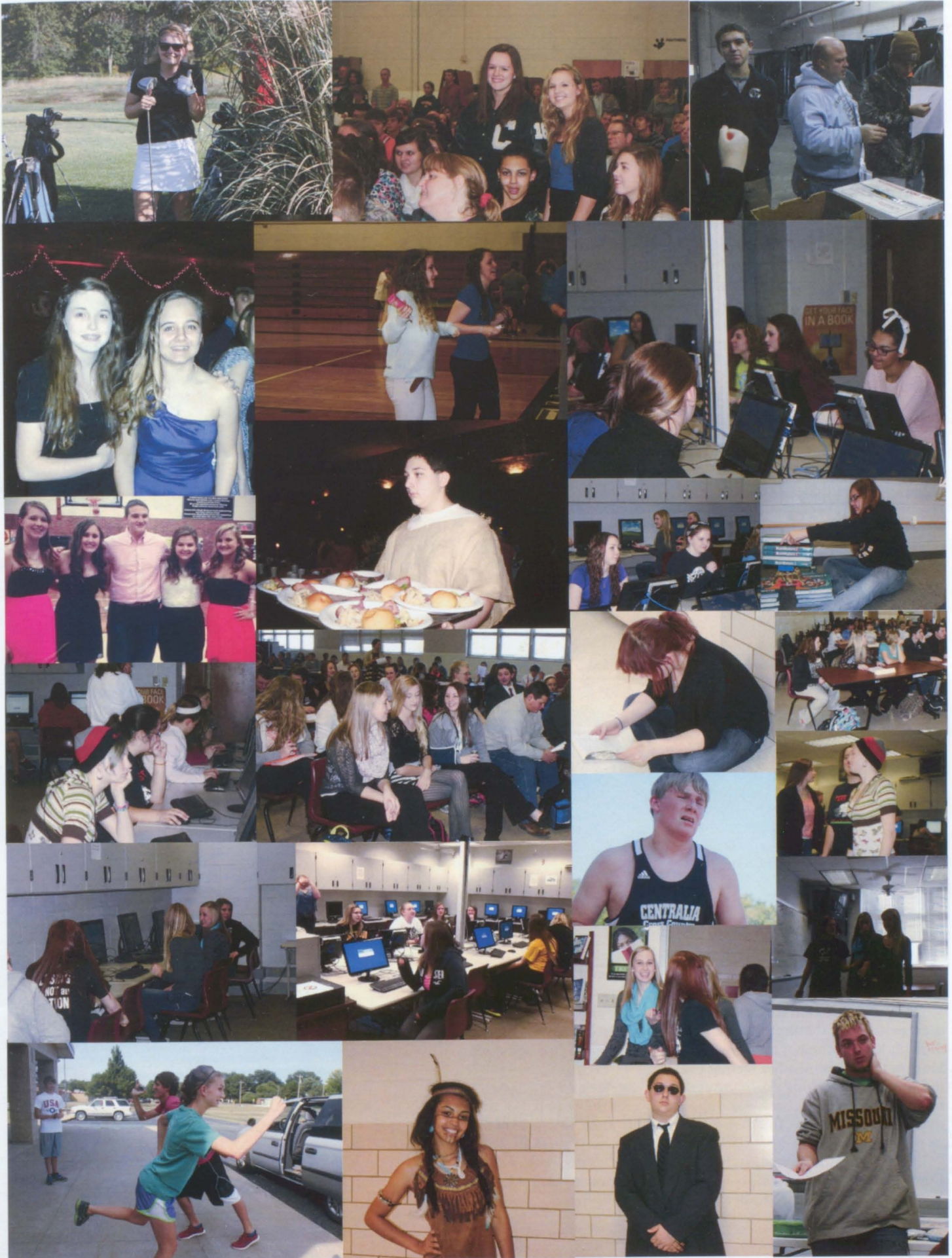

Freshman end the season with a record of 4-2-1. This wasn't their hope for the season, but they were still proud of their first year of Centralia High School Football.

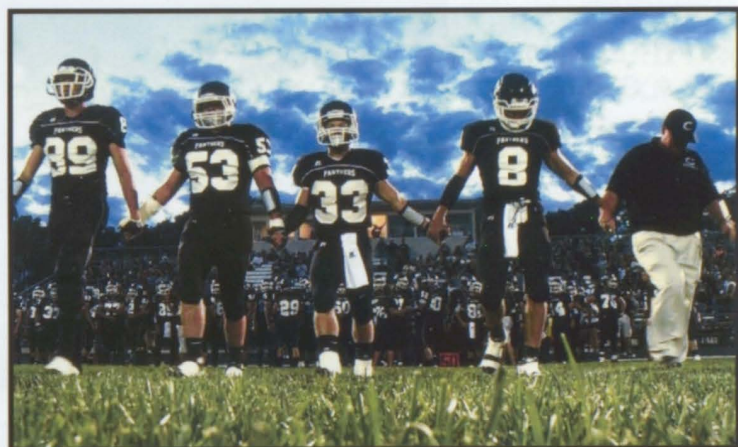
This football season was overall a winning year ending with a total record of 16-8-1.

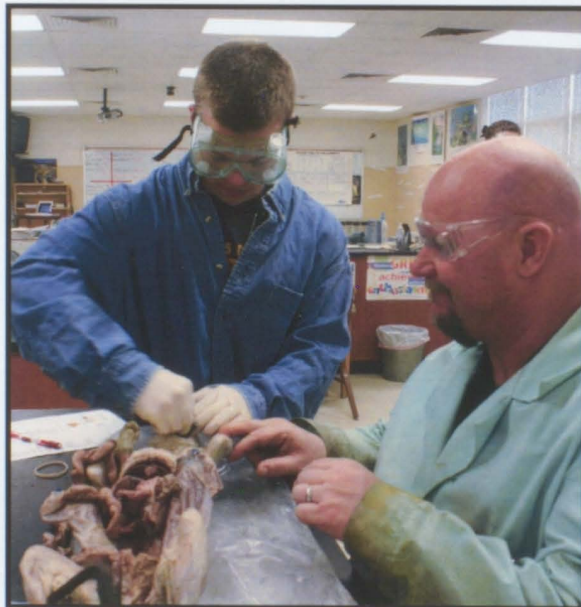

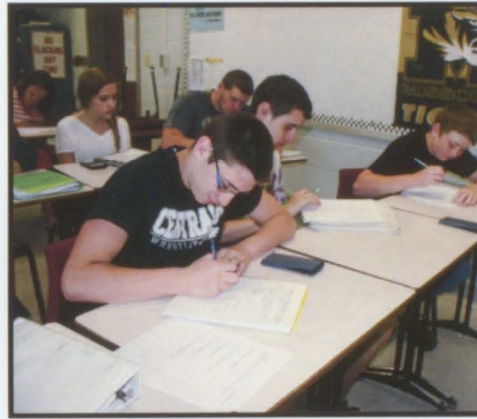

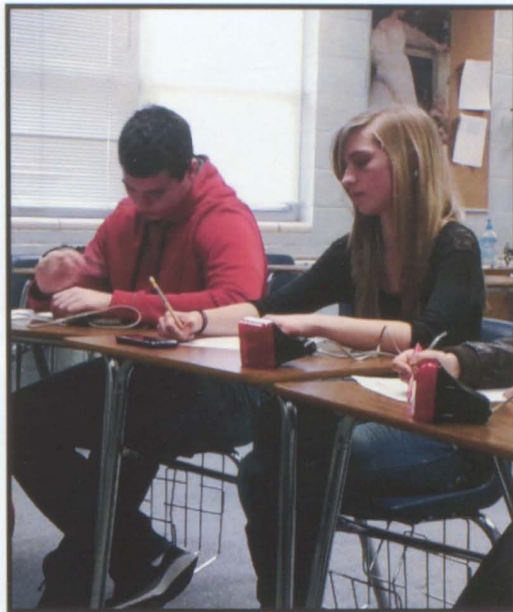
## Do You Remember the Answer? CHS Quiz Bowl Members Say Yes

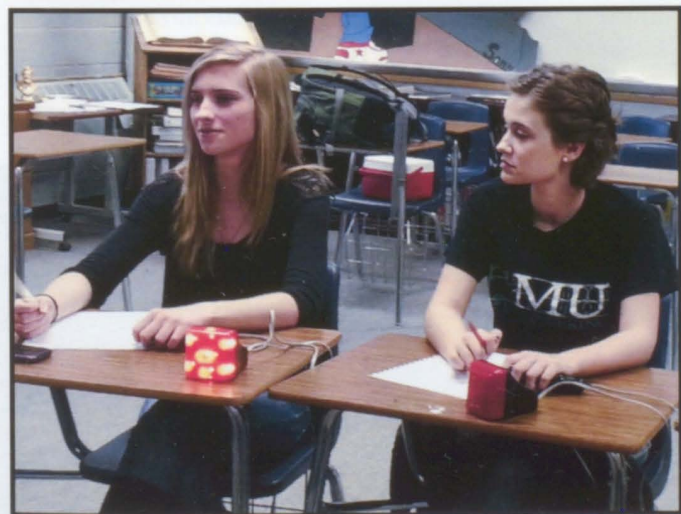

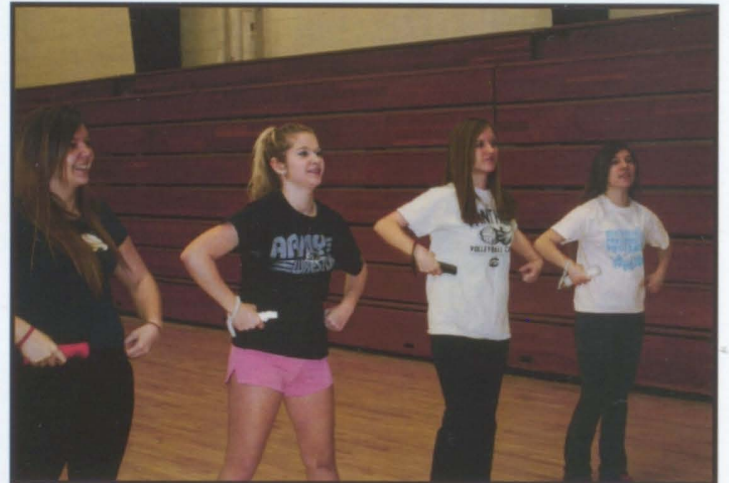

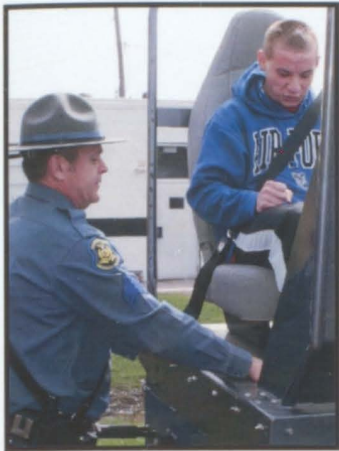

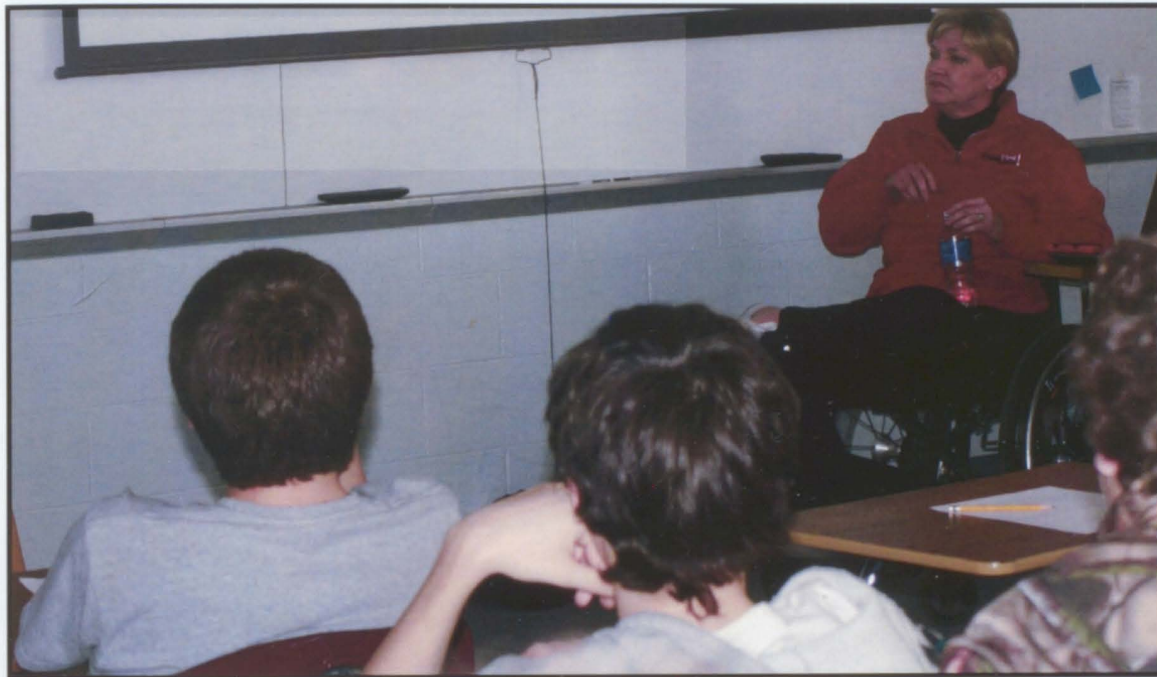
While P.E. is focused on physical exercise, Health class primarily focuses on making healthy decisions.

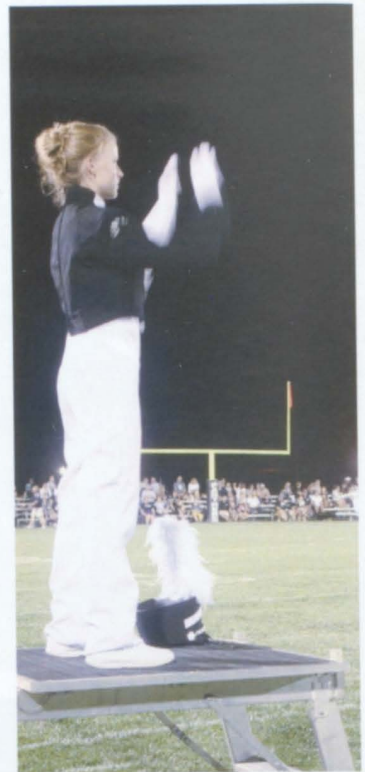

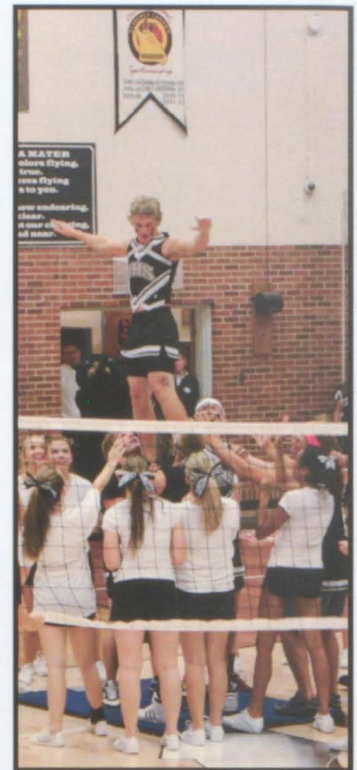
Although their journey ended at districts, the band was very proud of the accomplishments they made.

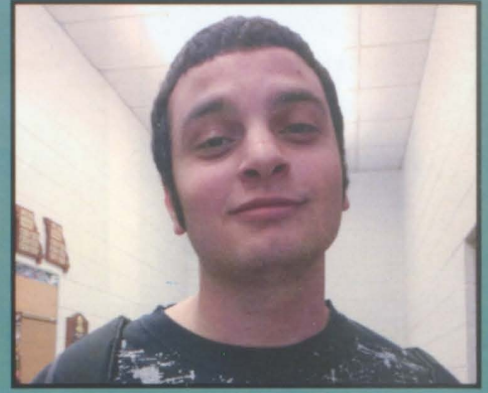

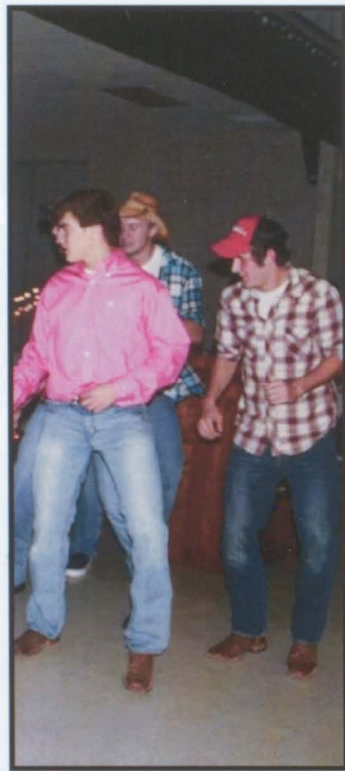

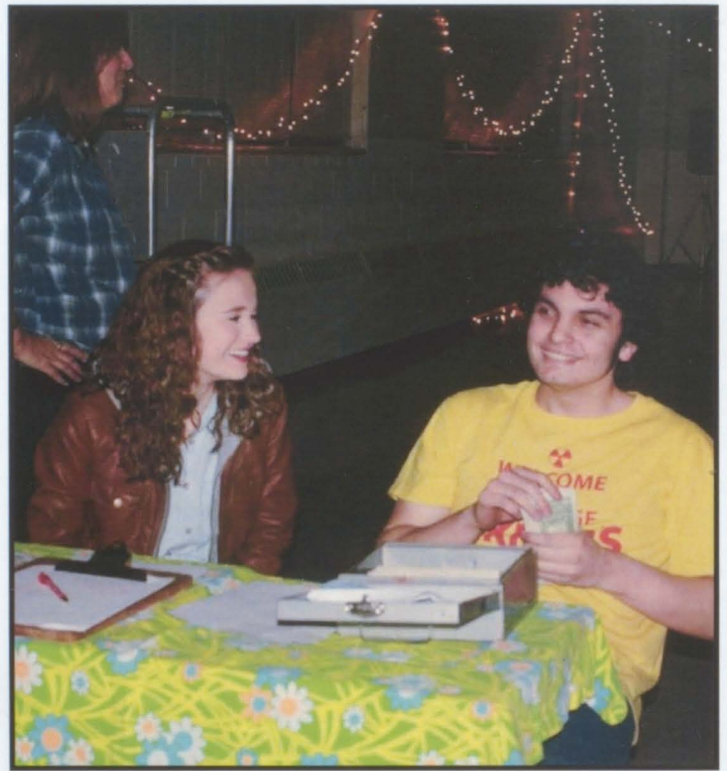

The team was mostly made up of freshmen and other inexperienced wrestlers. More practice time was needed. Some extra practices were even held.

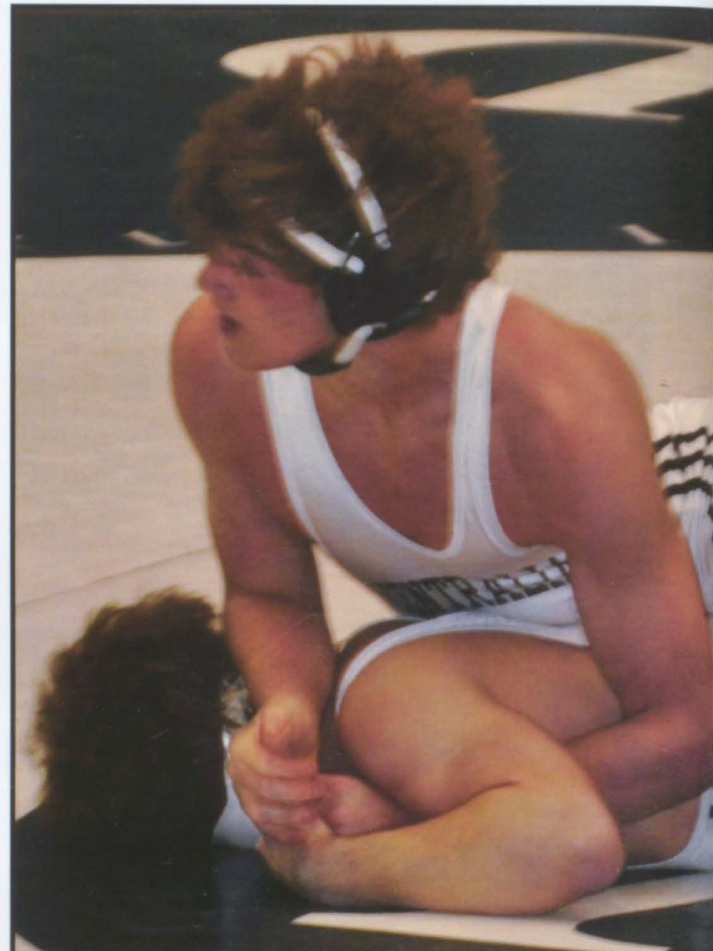
Through guidance from the coaching staff and the two juniors and only senior, the team was able to improve as a whole. The wrestling was hard and clean.

"All of the wrestlers followed this year's team

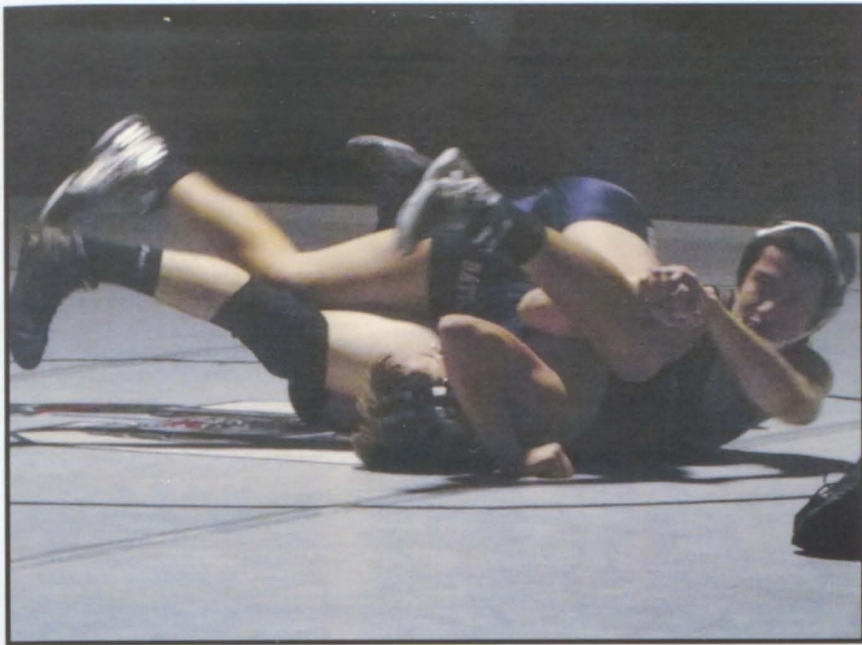

So it goes to show, standing alone and carrying no regrets can take a wrestler very far in the season.



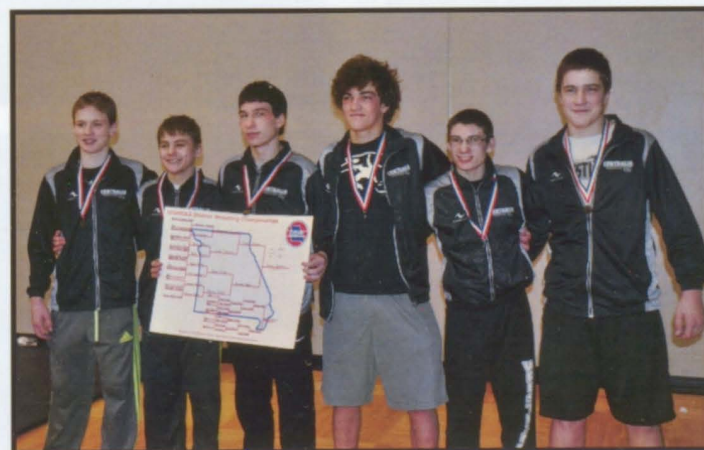
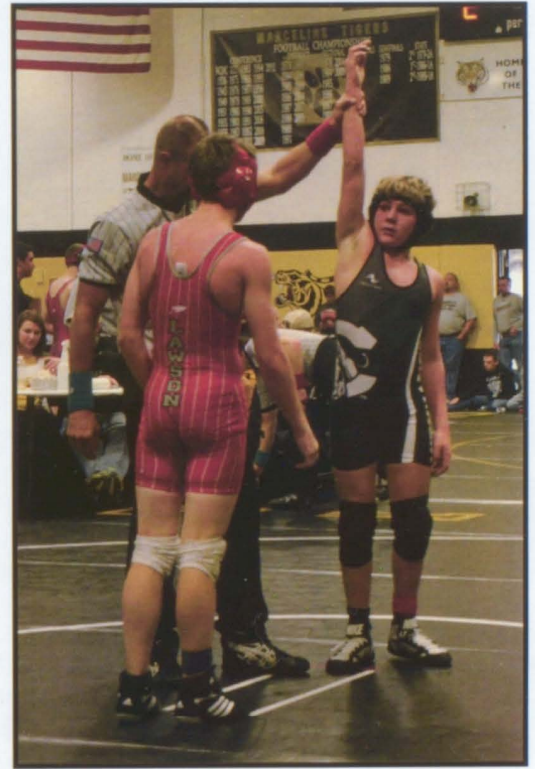
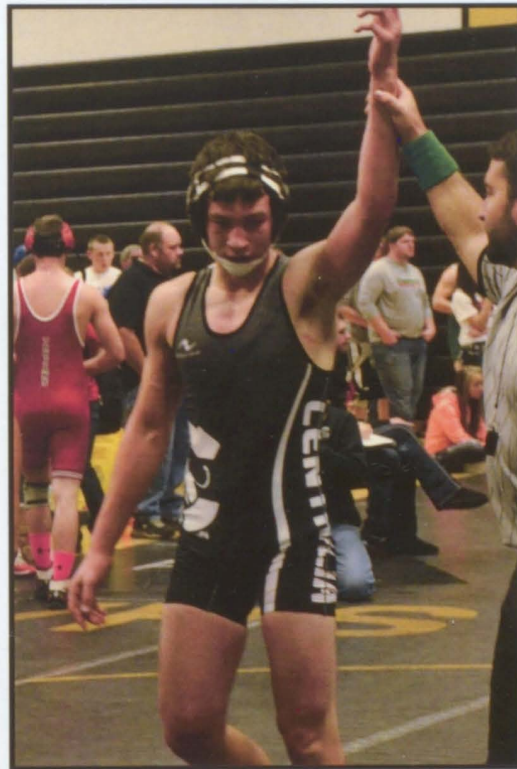

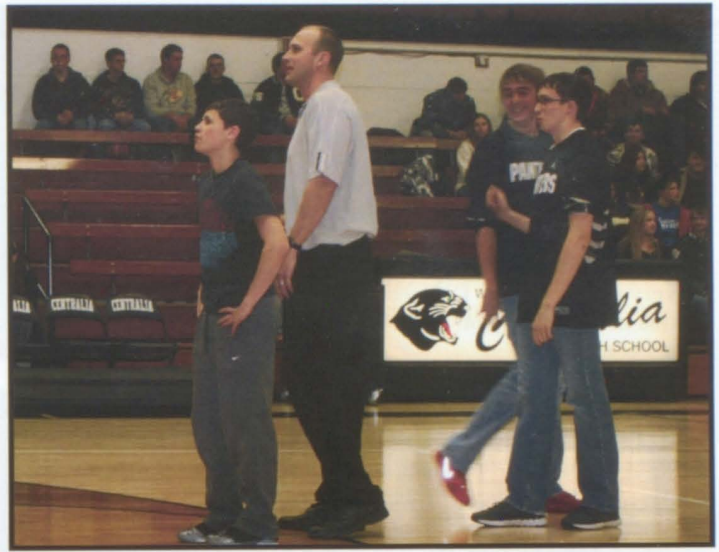
StuCo was not alone in getting the students of CHS inspired this year. Key Club also put on various blood drives, the

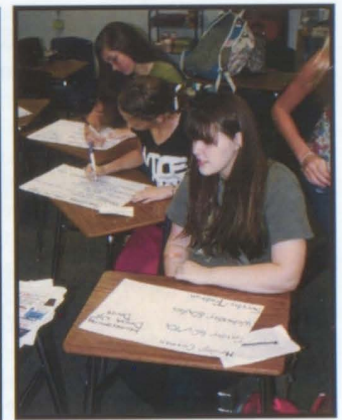

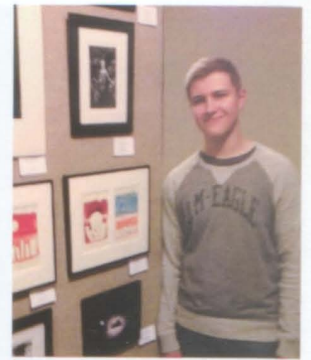

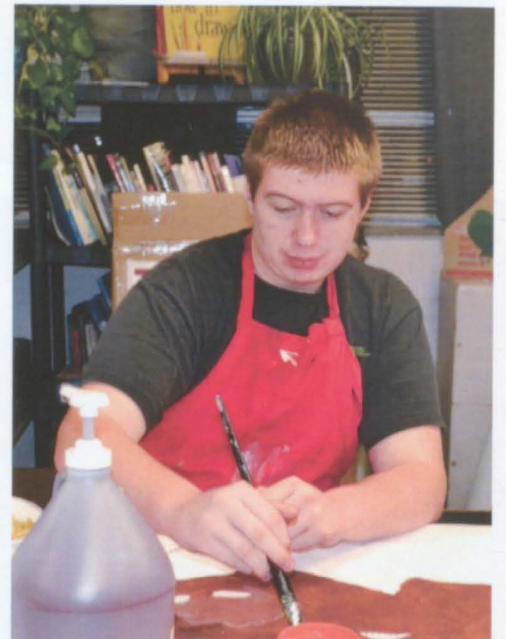

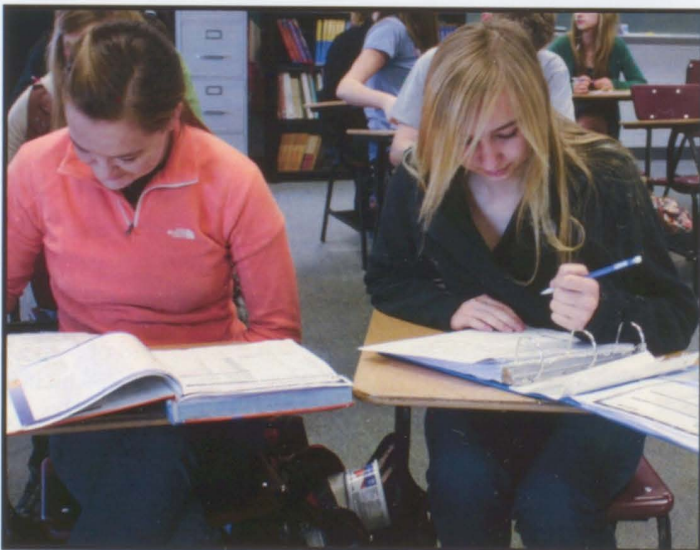

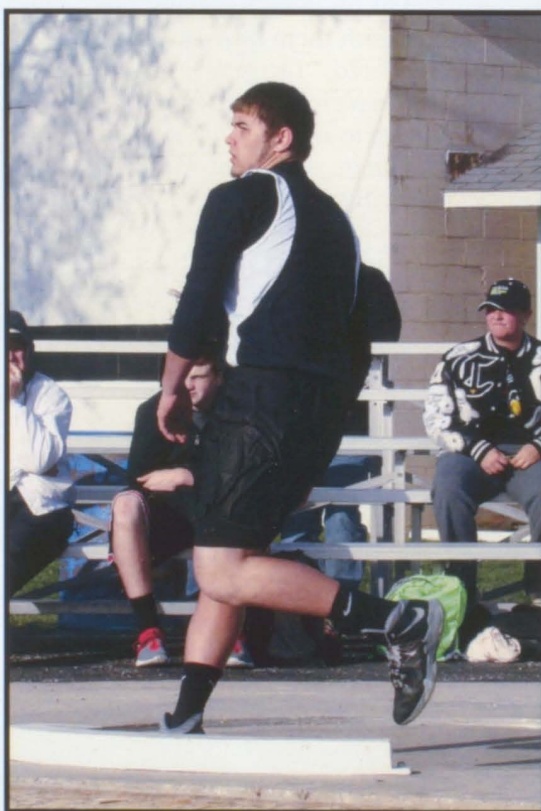

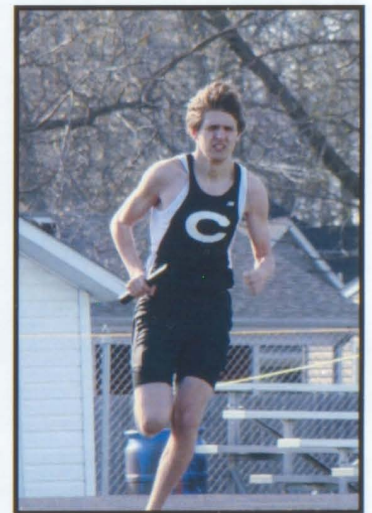

Horn was not the only Panther to be honored. Logan Ross (So) and Khaldoon Saleh (Sr) were also named all-conference athletes.

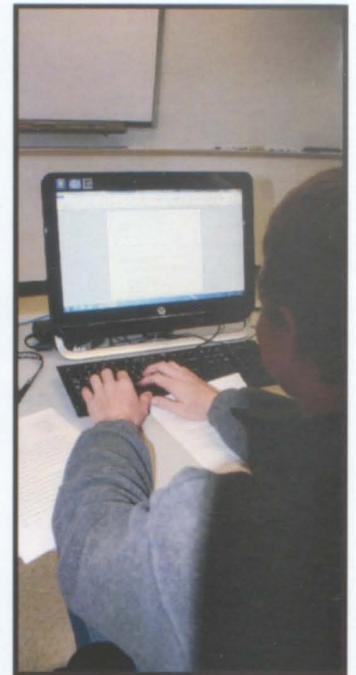

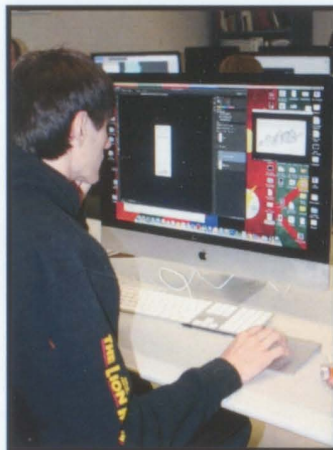

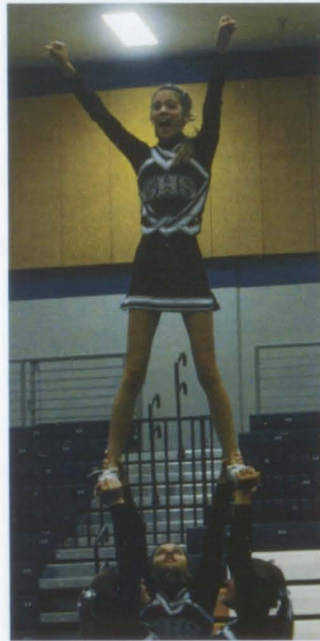

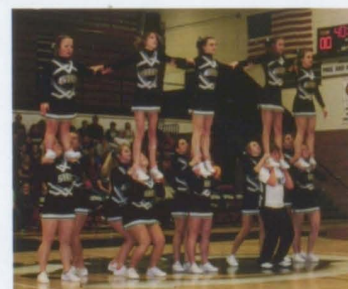

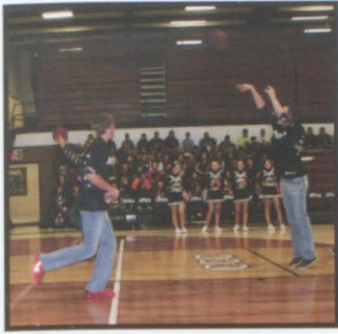

Every year, StuCo picks

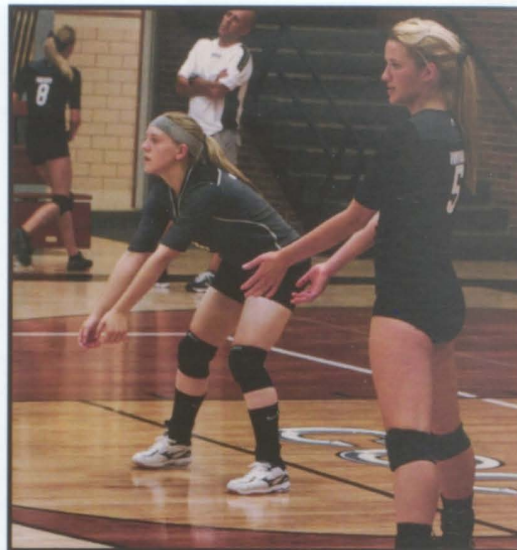
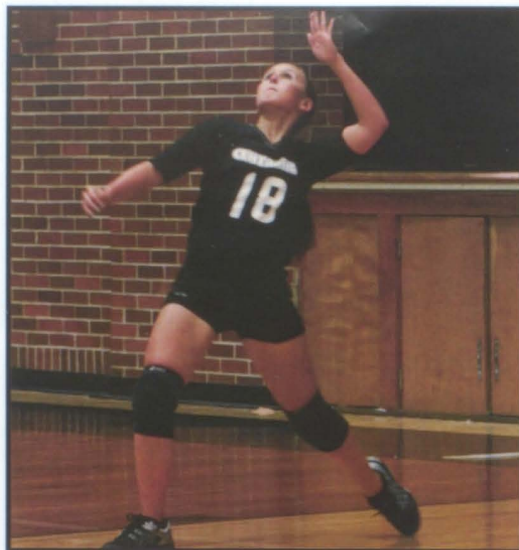

Dieker said "It was such a nice achievement, and I

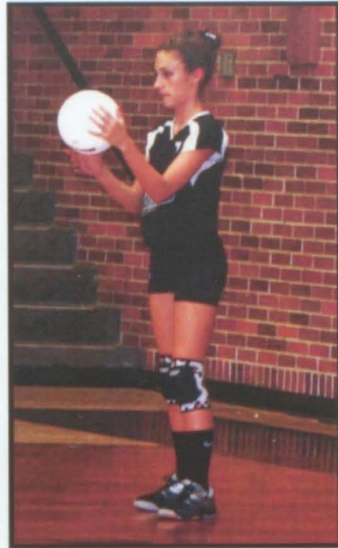
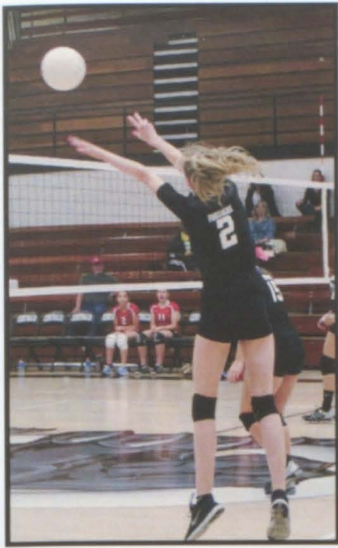
felt as though as I worked hard to set a record of my own."

"The girls made great strides and showed a lot of improvement" said Coach Martin, "I'm probably most proud of how they represented CHS."



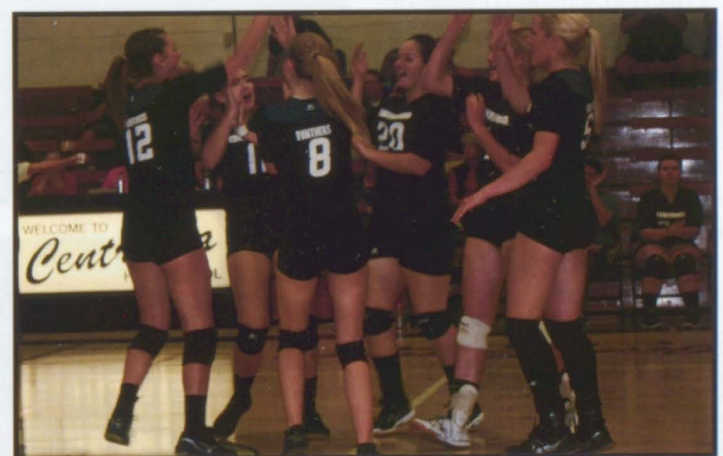
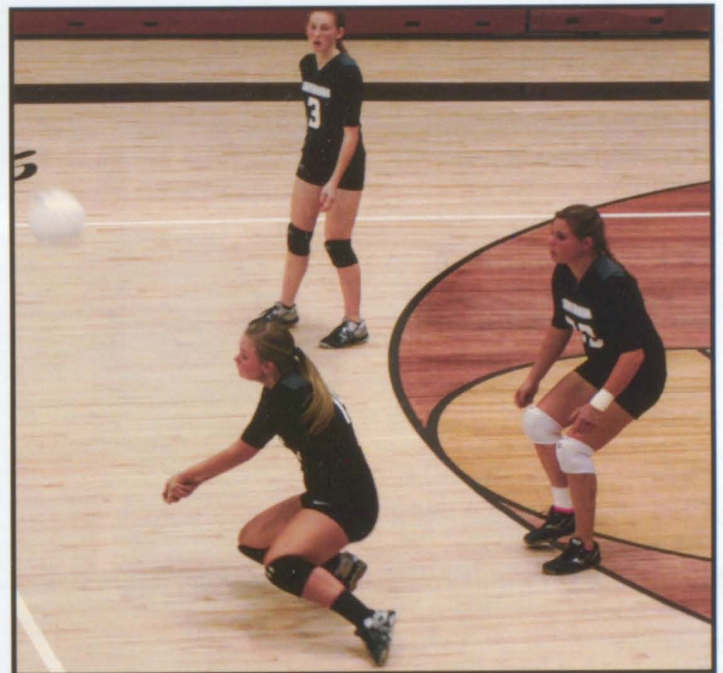
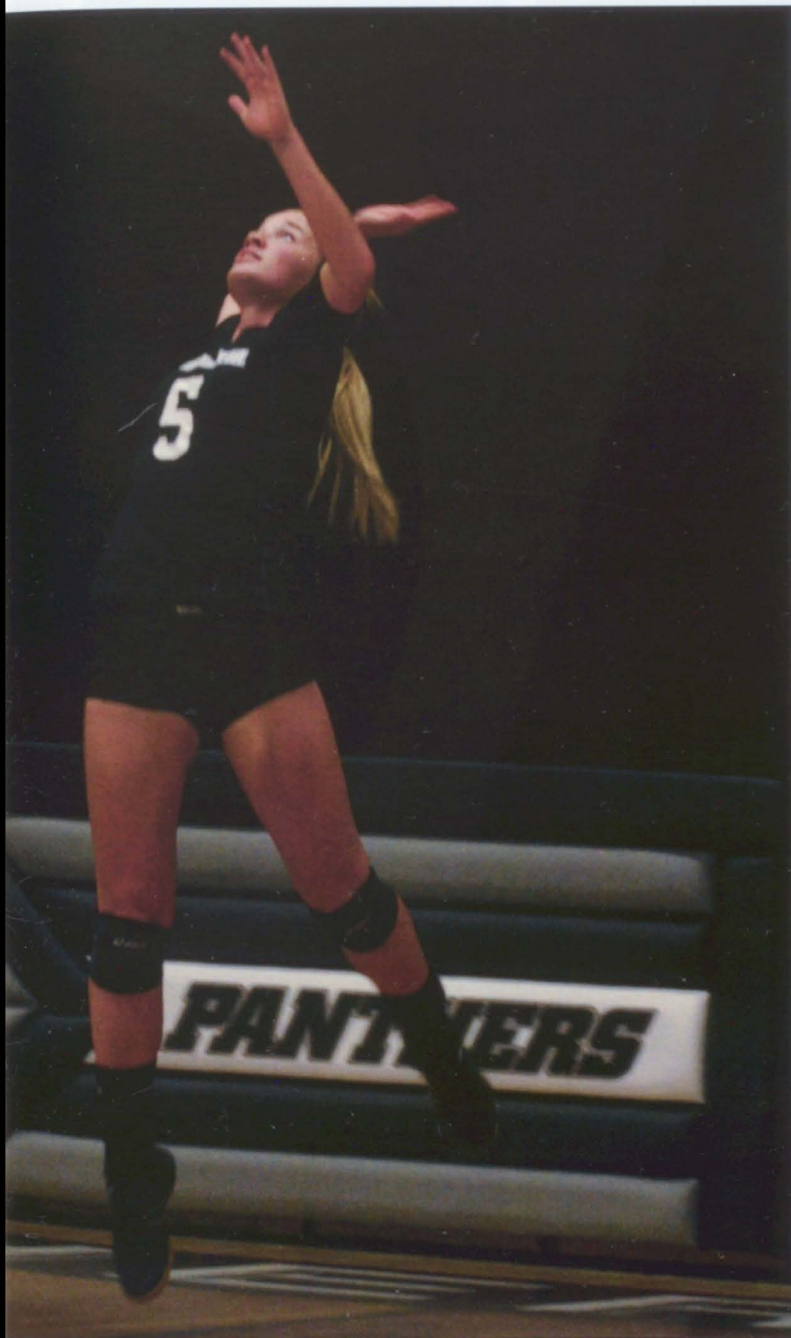

Overall, the boys had a very successful season, and were very proud of their season. But Coach Brown and Coach Gordon were the most excited, and are hoping for even more success in the future.

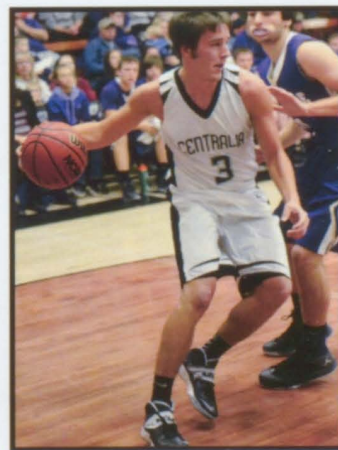
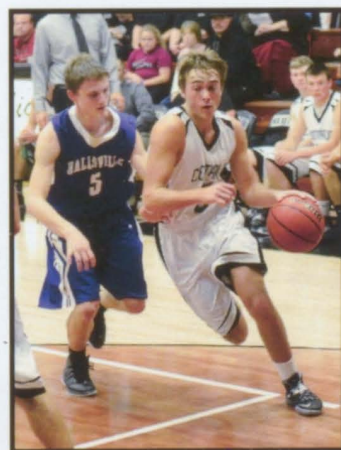
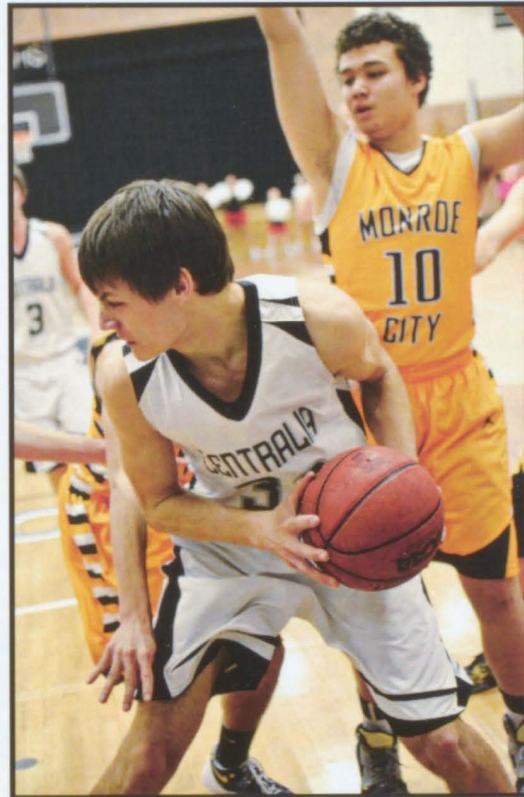

After all the hard work put in throughout the year, the Orchestra was rewarded at contest.

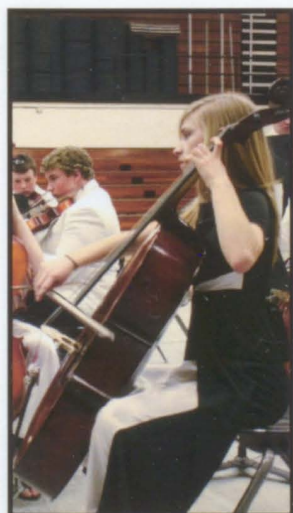

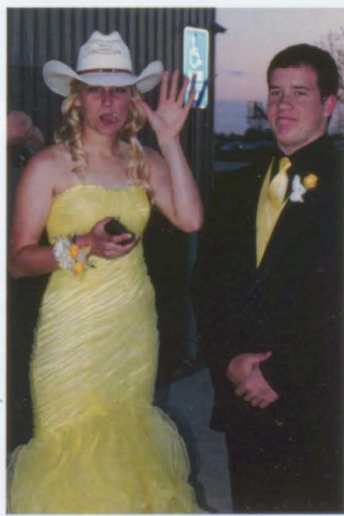
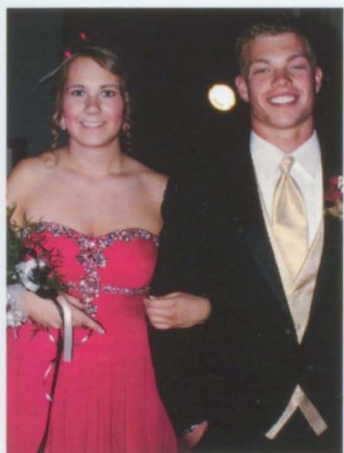
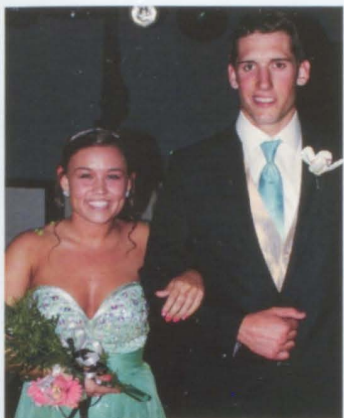
## Prom, the Time to See Everyone in Their Suit and Ties
