The first and second dances of the year were deejayed by Ken Kessler. Crowds of 150 students and guests showed up for both dances, which lasted from 9 pm-11 pm.





Stuco represented this event, and it raised a pretty good crowd despite the freezing temperatures.




"Songs" was the theme of this year's Courtwarming, and each class tried to incorporate that theme into their hall decorations and float.







Centralia Quad Ends Matwarming Week

Besides working on projects in class, the art students often display their work in the showcase by the office. Jon Angell displayed his painting in Angell's Department and Western Store.



The Centralia varsity golf team, although a relatively young one, had a successful year in 1983. The varsity, consisting of Brady Johnson, Rod Perkey, Tony Chance, Mark Kottwitz, and Bruce Dziedzic, had a respectable record until they faltered in the Clarence Cannon Conference meet. In the 18- hole meet, held at the Centralia Country Club, Monroe City won a playoff against Macon, as both teams were tied at 330 after the 18 holes. Centralia finished three back, at 333. Brady Johnson finished as runner-up medalist, carding a 6-over par 78.

Centralia then traveled to Kirksville, to compete in the district meet. As it turned out, the "home course advantage" was enough, as Kirksville won. Centralia finished a distant fifth, but Brady Johnson's fifth place individual finish qualified him for state competition, in Columbia. In Columbia, Brady shot a 36-hole total of 167 to finish 37th among 95 golfers competing in the tournament.















Mahieu, Dollens Advance to State Competition


Gerry Coleman and Teresa Dollens received the MVP awards in track on May 6 at the All-Sports Banquet.






